The approach into Elba in a southerly wind is interesting! Between the hills at 1200ft, 60° turn right down the valley while losing 1,000 fpm, and 60° turn left to runway 16. Small wonder that it is a VFR approach only, but we watched the scheduled turboprops doing it without turning a hair.
